WILDCATS BEGIN TWO-GAME ROAD SWING WITH VANDERBILT

After defeating Ole Miss 30-13 at Commonwealth Stadium for its first Southeastern Conference win of the season, the University of Kentucky football team begins a two-game road trip in SEC play, beginning with the Vanderbilt Commodores on Saturday at Vanderbilt Stadium in Nashville, Tenn.

Kentucky enters the game having won two of its last three games, including the impressive victory over the Rebels last week. UK was led in the win by true freshman quarterback Maxwell Smith, who made the most of his first-career start, completing 19 passes for a career-high 283 yards and two passing touchdowns. The 283 passing yards is the most by a UK true freshman in school history.

Several players stepped up offensively in the game for the Wildcats with junior tailback CoShik Williams rushing a career-high 25 times for 111 yards and two rushing touchdowns. UK also had two players with over 100 receiving yards with senior Matt Roark making seven catches for 116 yards and junior La'Rod King earning three catches for 102 yards and a touchdown. Junior wide receiver Gene McCaskill also had his first career touchdown in the game.

The UK defense performed well against Ole Miss, recording a season-high 10 tackles for loss. Senior linebacker Danny Trevathan led UK by tying a career high 17 tackles and grabbing his fourth career interception, while safety/linebacker Winston Guy had 10 tackles.

Saturday's contest between UK and VU marks the 83rd time the two teams have faced each other with Kentucky holding a 41-38-4 all-time record against Vanderbilt. UK has won eight of the last 10 games, dating back to the 2001 season.

QUICK NOTES

- UK ranks in the top 30 of three national statistical categories. The Cats are third in fewest yards penalized per game (32.44 penalty yards per game), 16th in net punting (39.65 net yards per punt) and 28th in pass defense (193.56 yards allowed per game).
- UK is trying for its fourth-straight win over Vanderbilt in Nashville. The Wildcats defeated the Commodores 24-13 in their last meeting at Vanderbilt Stadium in 2009.
- Seniors Danny Trevathan and Winston Guy are the SEC's top two tacklers. Trevathan has charted a career-high-tying 17 tackles in each of the past two games and is now the league's top tackler with 111 this season. Guy trails Trevathan with 93. The duo rank fifth and tied for 16th, respectively, in the nation with 12.3 and 10.3 tackles per game.
- Senior Matt Roark is coming off back-to-back games in which he led Kentucky in receiving. Against Mississippi State, Roark had a career-high 13 catches for 116 yards, while last week against Ole Miss the senior had seven catches for 116 yards. He is the first UK player to chart back-to-back 100-plus receiving yards games since Randall Cobb in 2010.
- UK is 7-1 under Joker Phillips in games that the Wildcats win the turnover margin.
- True freshman quarterback Maxwell Smith earned his first career start against Ole Miss, leading the Wildcats to victory with a career-high 283 yards passing and two touchdowns, including a career-long 55-yard strike to junior La'Rod King. Smith's 283 passing yards is the most ever by a UK true freshman. The previous record was 208 yards by Larry McCrimmon vs. Florida in 1978.
- Kentucky junior CoShik Williams has been a spark for the Kentucky rushing attack since filling in for the injured Josh Clemons and Raymond Sanders. In the past three games, Williams has rushed 62 times for 323 yards and two touchdowns. Both touchdowns came last week against Ole Miss.
- UK punter Ryan Tydlacka is second in the SEC and 17th in the nation in punting (43.98 yards per punt). Tydlacka leads the league with 15 punts of 50-plus yards this season.
- Kentucky's Joker Phillips is in his second season as head coach of the Wildcats after leading UK to a school record fifth-consecutive bowl game last season.

MILESTONES TO WATCH

- Kentucky senior linebacker Danny Trevathan has 342 tackles in his career and is currently tied for 14th all-time on the UK career tackles list with Larry Smith (1983-86). Trevathan needs six tackles to move into a tie for 13th with Darryl Bishop (1971-73).
- Wide receiver La'Rod King has 1,134 career receiving yards and needs 66 more to move into a tie for 21st on UK's career receiving yards list with Stevie Johnson (2006-07).
- Matt Roark has blocked seven kicks in his career for the Wildcats, which ties Lonnell Dewalt for the UK career record for blocked kicks. Roark's blocks include six extra points and a field goal.

GAME NOTES VS. VANDERBILT

SCOUTING VANDERBILT

The Vanderbilt Commodores enter Saturday's game with Kentucky with a 4-5 record, including a 1-5 mark in the Southeastern Conference. Vanderbilt's last three losses have come against SEC foes Georgia, Arkansas and Florida by a combined total of only 13 points. VU's SEC win was a 30-7 victory over Ole Miss in Nashville.

Offensively, Vanderbilt has been led this season by junior college transfer Jordan Rodgers, who is first on the team in passing and second on the team in rushing. Rodgers has completed 68-of-113 passes (51.1 percent) for 959 yards and five touchdowns along with five interceptions. Rodgers has rushed 68 times for 277 yards and four touchdowns.

Junior running back Zac Stacy leads the team in rushing with 110 carries for 756 yards, averaging 6.9 yards per carry. Stacy also has six rushing touchdowns on the season. True freshman running back Jerron Seymour is third on the team in rushing with 61 carries for 217 yards and four touchdowns.

Rodgers' favorite target this season has been sophomore wide receiver Jordan Matthews, who is first on the team in receiving with 23 catches for 438 yards, an average of 19 yards per catch, and three touchdowns. Fellow sophomore wide receiver Jonathan Krause has 21 catches for 149 yards, while sophomore running back Wesley Tate is third on the team in receiving with 18 catches for 152 yards. Redshirt freshman wide receiver Chris Boyd is fourth on the team in receiving, but has the most receiving touchdowns on the team with five.

Defensively, Vanderbilt is led by senior linebacker Chris Marve, who has 65 tackles, six tackles for loss, one sack, two pass breakups and one quarterback hurry. Junior defensive tackle Rob Lohr leads the team with 11.5 tackles for loss, while senior defensive end Tim Fugger has 11 tackles for loss. Both Lohr and Fugger are tied for the team lead in sacks with five. Senior defensive back Casey Hayward leads the Commodore secondary with a team high five interceptions and nine pass breakups.

SERIES HISTORY VS. VANDERBILT

Vanderbilt and Kentucky meet for the 84th time in school history Saturday ... Kentucky leads the all-time series 41-38-4 ... Kentucky defeated Vanderbilt 38-20 last season in Lexington ... The Wildcats have won two straight against the Commodores and eight of the last 10 meetings against Vanderbilt, dating back to the 2001 season ... Vanderbilt leads the all-time series in games played in Nashville 24-19-2, however Kentucky has won three straight in the Music City over VU dating back to the 2005 season ... The last time the two played in Nashville, UK won 24-13 ... The teams first meet in 1896, a 6-0 Vanderbilt victory in Nashville ... The teams have met annually since 1953 ... The series has had a remarkable number of close games, as 35 of the 83 games (42.2 percent) have been decided by seven

points or less, with UK leading the series 16-15-4 in those games ... Kentucky has shut out the Commodores six times, while Vanderbilt has recorded 13 shutouts in the series history ... Biggest UK win: 51 points (1978, 53-2 in Lexington) ... Biggest Vandy win: 50 points (1897, 50-0 in Nashville) ... Current streak: UK has won two straight.

KENTUCKY-VANDERBILT TIES

- Vanderbilt has one player on its 2011 roster that is from the state of Kentucky. Wide receiver John Cole, a redshirt junior, is from Somerset, Ky., and attended Somerset High School.
- Kentucky has nine players on its roster from the state of Tennessee, including defensive lineman Christian Coleman (Milan), Patrick Ligon (Germantown), Shaquille Love (Harriman), Martavius Neloms (Memphis), Tyler Robinson (Friendsville), William Tanner (Nashville), Collins Ukwu (La Vergne), Darrell "D.J." Warren (Alcoa) and Avery Williamson (Milan).
- Historically two of Kentucky's early coaches, John J. Tigert and S.A. Boles, were Vanderbilt graduates. Tigert coached UK to a 10-2-3 mark in 1915-16 and Boles had a 3-5-1 record in 1917.
- UK assistant head coach and defensive line coach David Turner coached at Vanderbilt from 2002-05 when he served as the recruiting coordinator and defensive line coach for the Commodores.
- Current Vanderbilt defensive recruiting coordinator and defensive backs coach Wesley McGriff coached at Kentucky in 2001 and 2002 under former UK head coach Guy Morriss. In 2001, McGriff coached running backs and then coached cornerbacks in 2002.

LAST TIME VS. VANDERBILT

Randall Cobb rushed for 170 yards and two touchdowns and Derrick Locke ran for 145 yards and two TDs in guiding Kentucky to the sixth win of the season, topping Vanderbilt 38-20 on Senior Day at Commonwealth Stadium. The win made UK bowl eligible as the Wildcats eventually advanced to their fifth consecutive bowl game.

Vanderbilt opened the scoring with a field goal on its first possession of the game and the teams traded scores after that, with the Commodores leading at halftime 13-10 on the strength of a four-yard touchdown run by quarterback Larry Smith.

Inspired by a fiery halftime speech from senior defensive tackle Ricky Lumpkin, Kentucky responded with 28 unanswered points to take control of the game.

Cobb started the second half scoring for UK with an electrifying 73-yard scamper to give the Cats a 17-13 lead. Cobb's impressive day was highlighted by breaking the UK single-season record for all-purpose yardage.

On the next possession, Cobb appeared to be thrown for a big loss, only to break loose on a mercurial 52-yard run. Locke finished the six-play 80-yard drive with a one-yard touchdown run.

Leading 24-13, senior quarterback Mike Hartline threw a perfect pass to senior wide receiver Chris Matthews for a 55-yard touchdown to get the crowd on its feet and give the Cats some breathing room. Hartline finished 15-of-23 for 232 yards and one touchdown. Matthews had five receptions for 97 yards and one touchdown.

A senior from Hugo, Okla., Locke's final carry at Commonwealth Stadium was a career-long 83-yard dash to put the Wildcats ahead 38-13.

The Kentucky defense played an outstanding second half. Safety Winston Guy led the way with a career-high 18 tackles, including 2.5 for loss. Linebacker Danny Trevathan had 10 stops, his seventh-consecutive game in double figures.

TURNOVERS TELL THE TALE

Turnover margin has been called the most important statistic in football and Kentucky Coach Joker Phillips certainly would agree.

In Phillips' two seasons as head coach, UK is 7-1 in games in which the Wildcats win the turnover margin; 2-2 when the margin is tied; and 1-9 when the Cats lose the turnover battle.

Put another way, UK is +10 in turnover margin in victories and -16 in losses in the 2010 and 2011 seasons.

UK IN THE BLUE ZONE (20-AND-IN)

UK ranks 10th in the SEC in "Blue Zone" defense as opponents have converted 21 of 25 opportunities (84.0 percent) for 118 points (14 touchdowns, seven field goals, one turnover, one missed field goal, one lost on downs).

CollegeFootballNews.com selected Trevathan as a first-team Mid-Season All-American and Guy second-team Mid-Season All-America. Both players were selected to CFN's All-SEC team.

Phil Steele's College Football honored five Wildcats. Trevathan and Warford led the way after being selected third-team All-Americans by the magazine. Senior safety/linebacker Winston Guy and punter Ryan Tydlacka were named honorable mention All-America.

All four Wildcats, along with junior wide receiver La'Rod King, were also selected by *Phil Steele's College Football* Mid-Season All-SEC Team. Trevathan and Warford made the first team, while Guy was placed on the second team and King and Tydlacka on the third team.

Roark had 116 yards receiving and junior wide receiver La'Rod King had 102 yards receiving. It marked the second time this season the UK offense has had a 100-yard rusher and 100-yard receiving in the same game.

- UK had two 100-yard receivers in the Ole Miss game for the first time since Randall Cobb and Derrick Locke had over 100 yards against Ole Miss last season.
- True freshman Maxwell Smith led the Kentucky fourth quarter comeback against the Rebels, posting a season high 283 passing yards and his first two collegiate touchdown passes. Smith's 283 passing yards is the most in school history by a true freshman quarterback. The previous record was 208 yards by Larry McCrimmon vs. Florida in 1978.
- Smith and King connected on a 55-yard pass late in the fourth quarter against Ole Miss, which was the longest pass play of the season for Kentucky.
- Junior wide receiver Gene McCaskill had an eight-yard touchdown reception against Ole Miss for his first collegiate touchdown.
- UK completed a season-high 29 passes vs. Mississippi State for 189 yards, the second-highest passing yard total for the Wildcats this season.
- With starter Morgan Newton out of the game with injury, true freshman quarterback Maxwell Smith set a career-high in completions in the game, going 26-of-33 for 174 yards.
- UK scored a season-high 38 points in the win over Jacksonville State.
- Kentucky charted a season-high 340 rushing yards vs. Jacksonville State, the most for the Cats since Nov. 13, 2010 when UK ran for 341 yards vs. Vanderbilt.
- UK also posted season-highs with 445 total yards on offense and 22 first downs vs. Jacksonville State.
- Quarterback Morgan Newton set career highs in the Louisville game by completing 27 of 41 passes for 255 yards and two touchdowns.
- The Wildcats offense has shown quick scoring ability this year as UK has scored eight of their 18 offensive touchdowns in drives that lasted less than two minutes. Kentucky had a :09 second touchdown drive and a :47 second touchdown drive against Central Michigan, while UK scored a touchdown in :14 seconds against Florida.
- UK used a season-high 10 receivers against Florida, completing 22-of-44 passes.
- Kentucky has scored on its first possession of the game three times this season. All three scores were field goals.

KING OF THE RECEIVERS

Junior wide receiver La'Rod King is leading the Wildcat receiving corps this season with 34 catches for 514 yards and seven touchdowns.

The junior from Radcliff, Ky., got the season off to a good start with a touchdown catch in each of the first four games, then added a pair of TDs against Jacksonville State.

Another highlight came in the JSU game



Commonwealth Stadium



On game day, Commonwealth Stadium usually becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

- The Cats are in their 39th season at Commonwealth Stadium.
- Since its opening in 1973, Kentucky has played 248 games within the friendly confines of Commonwealth Stadium. UK has a 133-111-4 record (.544) in Commonwealth.
- Since the 1999 expansion, UK has averaged 65,250 fans per game and ranked in the nation's top 25 teams in attendance for 11 seasons. Both the single game and season attendance record has been broken in recent years.
- In 2009, for the third-straight year, Kentucky fans broke the school record for average attendance at 69,594 per game. The previous mark was 69,434 per game in the 2008 season.
- The crowd of 71,024 vs. Florida on Oct. 20, 2007 was the largest crowd in the 38-year history of Commonwealth Stadium. The previous stadium record was 71,022 for the 1999 Tennessee game.
- The playing surface is named C.M. Newton Field in honor of the former UK Director of Athletics.

Facts and Figures on Commonwealth Stadium:

Seating Capacity: 67,942, including the Commonwealth Suites. With game workers, media, etc., total attendance can exceed 70,000.

Video Boards: Newly installed video boards by Daktronics measuring at 39 by 79 feet, each, will bring a total of 6,162 square feet of video capability. The new video boards put UK among the nation's leaders in video square footage.

Sound System: Also new for 2011, the Sportsound system will deliver pounding bass energy, smooth mid- and high-range frequencies, and high-impact entertainment. Components of the sound system include a main speaker cluster behind the end zone, under-balcony speakers and concourse speakers.

Ribbon Boards: Commonwealth Stadium's interior seating bowl will have new LED ribbon boards, allowing fans a more enjoyable experience.

Game Day Experiences

The "Cat Walk": Fans are encouraged to greet the team when the Wildcats arrive for the "Cat Walk." The team buses will arrive at the Nutter Field House approximately two hours and 15 minutes before the game and the players will make the "Cat Walk" to their stadium entry point at Gate 1. Fans are encouraged to line up on the sidewalk and cheer the players as they enter the stadium.

A siren will be sounded while the team buses are on their way to the stadium. That's the fans' cue to proceed to the Cat Walk area to greet the team.

Wildcat Refuge: Fans of all ages, but especially the younger Wildcats, will enjoy playing at the Wildcat Refuge, located outside of the southwest corner (outside Gate 9) of Commonwealth Stadium. There are five giant inflatable games that are available two hours before kickoff.

UK Marching Band Will Parade Around Stadium: The UK Marching Band will parade around the stadium, beginning approximately one hour prior to kickoff. The band and parade will begin at and return to Gate 4.

when King became the 22nd player in school history to reach 1,000 career receiving yards.

Additional highlights of the season feature the Central Michigan game, when King caught five balls for 100 yards (his first 100-yard game), and the Louisville contest, in which he grabbed a career-high seven receptions.

Last week against Ole Miss, King caught three passes for 102 yards and a touchdown, including the longest reception of the season for the Wildcats when he and quarterback Maxwell Smith connected on a 55-yard reception in the fourth quarter.

For the season, King ranks tied for second in the SEC in touchdown catches (7) and is seventh in the league in receptions per game (3.8) and seventh in receiving yards per game (57.1).

TAKING IT TO THE MAX ...

True freshman quarterback Maxwell Smith has made the most of the playing time he's received over the past two games.

After Morgan Newton left the Mississippi State game because of injury, Smith came in and did well in the game, completing 26-of-33 passes for 174 yards.

With Newton still sidelined, Smith received his first career start against Ole Miss, completing 19-of-36 passes for 283 yards and two touchdowns. Smith's 283 yards is the most in school history by a true freshman quarterback, passing the previous record which was 208 yards by Larry McCrimmon vs. Florida in 1978.

Smith has been especially efficient in the fourth quarter when the throws matter most. In the final two drives against Mississippi State which stretched from the closing minutes of the third quarter through the end of the game, he went 15-17 for 126 yards. UK also scored its lone TD of the game on the first of those two drives, a four-yard scamper from tailback Jonathan George.

Smith stepped up in the fourth quarter again vs. Ole Miss, going 4-of-8 for 110 yards and two touchdowns, leading the Cats back from a three-point deficit at the beginning of the quarter to a 17-point victory by the final whistle.

INJURIES STRIKE TAILBACK POSITION: CLEMONS OUT FOR SEASON, SANDERS MISSES TIME

Both of Kentucky's tailbacks who have started this season, Josh Clemons and Raymond Sanders, are dealing with injury problems.

Clemons, who for a majority of the season was the team's leading rusher, was lost for the season because of a knee injury in the South Carolina game. Sanders incurred a knee injury vs. Central Michigan and had to miss three games, then sustained a sprained ankle vs. Jacksonville State and missed the Mississippi State and Ole Miss games. His status is uncertain for the Vanderbilt game, according to Coach Joker Phillips.

WHERE THERE'S A WILL(IAMS), THERE'S A WAY

With Josh Clemons and Raymond Sanders sidelined by injuries (see above), CoShik Williams has carried the load at tailback.

As UK's primary ballcarrier in the last three games, Williams has rushed for 323 yards, an average of 107.3 yards during that span. He had a career-high 148 yards in the win over Jacksonville State and picked up 111 stripes in the victory against Ole Miss.

For the season, Williams is now the team's leading rusher with 385 yards.

Williams came to Kentucky as a walk-on after fellow Hiram, Ga., native and former Kentucky star cornerback Trevard Lindley recommended the UK staff take a look at him.

INJURY BUG BITES UK O-LINE

With four starters and a part-time regular returning, the offensive line looked

to be in great shape for 2011. However, the injury bug bit hard as all five starters have been injured since practice began in August.

Right tackle Billy Joe Murphy missed the Central Michigan and Louisville games with an injury, while true freshman Darrian Miller started in his place. Starting center Matt Smith missed the first two games but returned in a reserve role in the Louisville game.

The group has gradually returned to form, however, and has started together the last six games.

DEFENSIVE HIGHLIGHTS

- With at least three more games to play, the UK defense already has passed the number of takeaways from last season. In nine games, UK's defense has forced 17 turnovers, 11 interceptions and six fumbles.
- UK has earned at least one takeaway on defense in four straight games.
- UK also ranks eighth in the SEC and 28th in the nation in pass defense, limiting opponents to 193.56 passing yards per game.
- Kentucky's defense played well against Ole Miss, limiting the Rebels to one offensive touchdown and earning a season-high 10 tackles for loss.
- Trevathan led the way for UK against Ole Miss, earning his fourth career interception.
- Martavius Neloms' fumble return for a TD vs. Jacksonville State was the first for UK since Ventrell Jenkins' 56-yard return vs. East Carolina in 2009 (Jan. 2).
- UK held WKU to 234 total yards, the fewest by an opponent since Akron's 172 total yards a year ago on Sept. 18, 2010.

- Kentucky's defense held WKU without a TD, surrendering only three points. That's the lowest scoring output by an opponent since shutting out Miami-Ohio, 42-0, on Sept. 5, 2009 in Cincinnati.
- The UK defense totaled four interceptions vs. WKU, the most by Kentucky since four picks vs. Idaho State on Sept. 10, 2005. The last time UK forced four turnovers was in its win over USC on Oct. 16, 2010.
- Kentucky's defense charted a season-high four sacks vs. Louisville.
- In its first two SEC games this season, UK's defense only allowed 16 pass completions (eight vs. Florida and LSU).

WELCOME TO THE 300 TACKLE CLUB, MR. TREVATHAN

University of Kentucky All-American linebacker Danny Trevathan became the 18th player in school history to record over 300 tackles in a career.

The native of Leesburg, Fla., has 342 tackles in his career at Kentucky and needs six tackles to tie Darryl Bishop (1971-73) for 13th all time.

Trevathan has had a spectacular career as a Wildcat. Below is Trevathan's career tackles by season.

TREVATHAN LEADS THE SEC IN TACKLES ... AGAIN

Senior linebacker Danny Trevathan has picked up where he left off a year ago.

Trevathan has 111 tackles this season, which leads the SEC and ranks tied for fifth nationally in that category. He led the SEC last season with 144 tackles.

So far this season, Trevathan has earned 12 or more tackles in seven of UK's nine games, posting a career-high-tying 17 tackles vs. Mississippi State and Ole Miss, 13 against WKU, LSU and USC, and 12 vs. CMU and Louisville.

For his effort against Ole Miss, Trevathan was awarded with an ESPN SEC Helmet Sticker.

Against Florida, Trevathan gathered eight tackles, which snapped his streak of 12 consecutive games with double-figure tackles, including the last nine games of the 2010 season.

Trevathan also leads UK in interceptions with four. He has swiped an interception in three straight games, becoming the first player to do so since Tremayne Martin had three interceptions in the first three games of the 1997 season.

HE'S THE GUY

Hybrid safety/linebacker Winston Guy has been all over the field for the Wildcats this season. He ranks second in the SEC behind teammate Danny Trevathan with 93 total tackles this season. That mark ranks him tied for 16th in the nation. Guy also leads Kentucky in tackles for loss with 11.

Against WKU, the senior from Lexington, Ky., not only charted 10 tackles but led the team in tackles for loss (2.5 for 8 yards) and interceptions (2) in his new role as a hybrid safety/linebacker. He was named the Defensive Back Performer of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards for his impressive play vs. WKU.

In the Central Michigan game, Guy posted 13 tackles, just the second time in his career he has had back-to-back games with double-figure tackles.

Against Florida, Guy led UK in tackles with 11, including 0.5 tackles for loss and vs. LSU he recorded 12 tackles, including two for loss.

Guy continued his impressive tackling attack against South Carolina, gathering a season-high 14 tackles to lead Kentucky in tackles. Guy also had two tackles for loss against USC.

Against Jacksonville State, he led UK with 12 tackles, including two pass break-ups. It marked the sixth time this season and 10th time in his career he has had double-digit tackles.

Guy recorded his seventh double-figure tackle game of the season against Ole Miss, earned 10 tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss.

UKWU FULFILLING THE PREDICTION

Before the season, Coach Joker Phillips predicted that Collins Ukwu would be a standout performer and the junior defensive end was fulfilling his coach's words early in the season.

Ukwu had a quarterback sack in the opener vs. Western Kentucky and followed that with a career-best seven tackles in the Central Michigan game, featuring two tackles for loss, a pass breakup and a quarterback hurry.

However, the native of La Vergne, Tenn., did not play against Florida, LSU or South Carolina because of a sprained knee. He saw limited action vs. Jacksonville State, then started vs. Mississippi State and recovered a fumble.

Ukwu returned in a big way against Ole Miss, recording six tackles, one sack and two tackles for loss.

SPECIAL TEAM HIGHLIGHTS

- Ryan Tydlacka has been outstanding so far this season with 56 punts for an average of 44.0 yards and 13 punts inside the 20-yard line. Tydlacka's average puts him second in the SEC and 17th in the nation, while the Wildcats rank second in the conference in net punting as a team. He has three times been named the Honorable Mention Punter of the Week by the College Football Performance Awards.
- Kentucky currently ranks second in the SEC and 16th nationally in net punting with a mark of 39.65.
- Kentucky ranks fifth in the SEC in net kickoff coverage. UK averages 45.8 net yards per kickoff, which means opponents' average starting point after UK kickoffs is their own 25-yard line.
- Joe Mansour also has been named the Honorable Mention Kickoff Specialist of the Week three times this season. Against CMU, Mansour had six kickoffs and three touchbacks, while Mansour six kickoffs and three touchbacks against Ole Miss. Mansour has 37 kickoffs and 13 touchbacks this season.
- Craig McIntosh has handled the field goal kicking for UK this season. The native of Lexington, Ky., is 10-of-12 in field goals, including a season long of 48 yards against Ole Miss.

CAT SCRATCHES

FIRST-YEAR SUCCESS OF "OPERATION WIN"

Coach Joker Phillips notched a number of successes in 2010, his first year of "Operation Win" – win on the field, win in the classroom and win in the community.

On the field a year ago, Kentucky's season was highlighted by a win at in-state rival Louisville and an upset of No. 10 South Carolina, the eventual Eastern Division champion of the Southeastern Conference.

The season was topped by a trip to the BBVA Compass Bowl, making Phillips the first coach in Kentucky history to go to a bowl game in his first season. UK's six victories were the most for a first-year Wildcat coach since Blanton Collier in 1954.

In the classroom, the overall team grade-point average has risen over the past year. A total of 22 players earned a spot on the SEC Academic Honor Roll. Offensive tackle Billy Joe Murphy was voted to the Academic All-District team and advanced to the national ballot for Academic All-America.

Phillips and the Wildcats also have been very active in community service, completing numerous personal appearances and work projects.

WILDCATS STRIVE TO EXTEND RECORD STREAK

In 2011, the Kentucky football team is seeking to continue its school-record streak of five consecutive bowl games.

The Wildcats have advanced to postseason play each year since 2006, going to the Music City Bowl twice, followed by the AutoZone Liberty Bowl, another Music City Bowl and the BBVA Compass Bowl. The Wildcats won three of those matchups, defeating Clemson in 2006, Florida State in 2007 and East Carolina in the Liberty Bowl.

Kentucky is one of only 28 teams in the country that have gone to at least five-straight bowls. Alabama, Florida, Georgia, LSU and Kentucky are the Southeastern Conference teams that have accomplished that feat.

COACHING STAFF CHANGES

Two new assistant coaches have come on board since the end of the 2010 regular season as Joker Phillips brought in Rick Minter as co-defensive coordinator and Steve Pardue as running backs coach.

Phillips and Minter first worked together in 1997-98 at the University of Cincinnati, where Minter was head coach and Phillips was an assistant. Minter has rich experience as a defensive coordinator at Notre Dame, South Carolina, Marshall and Ball State.

Pardue and Phillips were longtime associates on the recruiting trail. Phillips was an annual visitor to LaGrange (Ga.) High School, where Pardue was head coach from 1994-2010 and won three state championships. Several Grangers went on to outstanding careers at UK, including linebackers Wesley Woodyard and Braxton Kelley and wide receiver Quentin McCord. Five Grangers are on the current Kentucky roster.

WILDCATS ADD NEW DEFENSIVE SCHEME; LOOK FOR MORE BIG PLAYS

Kentucky has developed a new look on defense this season as the Wildcats are adding the 3-4 defensive system to the 4-3 alignment already in place. With two players designated as "hybrids" -- a combination linebacker/defensive end and combination safety/linebacker, the UK defense has more flexibility to adapt to opponent offensive formations.

Coach Joker Phillips has stated that creating more big plays on defense – turnovers and negative-yardage plays – is a goal for the 2011 season. Turnovers have been called the most important statistic in football. It's interesting to note that Kentucky was +7 in turnover margin during the team's wins last season and had a -11 margin in the games lost.

TREVATHAN, GUY CALL DELAY OF (NFL) GAME

With both players citing "unfinished business" as a reason, All-America linebacker Danny Trevathan and All-Southeastern Conference safety Winston Guy went through the National Football League evaluation process in January but decided to remain at Kentucky for their senior seasons.

Trevathan led the SEC in tackles with 144 stops, most for a league player since 2002. He also had 16 tackles for loss and caused four fumbles. He was chosen first-team All-America by CollegeFootballNews.com and first-team All-SEC by multiple selectors.

Guy notched 106 tackles and led the team in interceptions with three pick-offs. He was tabbed second-team All-SEC by CollegeFootballNews.com and fourth-team All-SEC by *Phil Steele's College Football*.

TOP 11 TACKLERS RETURN

Kentucky fielded its most inexperienced defensive unit in 20 years in the 2010 season. The positive for the coming season is that the top 11 tacklers return from that youthful unit.

Linebacker Danny Trevathan and safety Winston Guy each topped the century mark last season with 144 and 106 tackles, respectively. The additional top stoppers returning are linebacker Ronnie Sneed (61 tackles), safety Mychal Bailey (58), cornerback-turned-safety Martavius Neloms (55), cornerback Randall Burden (36), cornerback Anthony Mosley (34), linebacker Ridge Wilson (30), end Taylor Wyndham (27), end Collins Ukwu (26) and tackle Mark Crawford (24).

MUCH PRODUCTION TO REPLACE

An obvious priority in 2011 will be replacing some of the most productive offensive players in Kentucky history, quarterback Mike Hartline, wide receivers Randall Cobb and Chris Matthews, and running back Derrick Locke.

Hartline threw for 3,178 yards last year, Cobb set the Southeastern Conference single-season record for all-purpose yardage, Matthews tied for the league lead in touchdown catches and Locke rushed for 2,618 yards in his career. All four earned various All-SEC honors and Cobb was a first-team All-American.

To put it in perspective, UK's returning players account for only 22 percent of last year's rushing yardage, 7.5 percent of the passing yardage and 31.1 percent of the receiving yardage.

On the bright side on offense, four starters return in the O-line, tackle Chandler Burden, guards Stuart Hines and Larry Warford and center Matt Smith. The new starter at right tackle is senior Billy Joe Murphy, who has significant experience in his career.

Another positive is that UK also has some experience returning at quarterback. Junior Morgan Newton has started nine games over the past two seasons when Hartline was sidelined. Newton's career stats feature 100 of 178 passing (56.2 percent) for 971 yards and six touchdowns.

Newton has a returning starter at wide receiver as La'Rod King caught 36 passes for 478 yards and five touchdowns last season. Raymond Sanders is the leading returning rusher with 254 yards.

SCHEDULE NOTES

Kentucky began the 2011 season on Thursday, Sept. 1, as the Wildcats took on Western Kentucky University in Nashville. The teams played at LP Field, home of the NFL's Tennessee Titans. UK had a similar scenario in 2009, when the Wildcats opened the slate in Cincinnati's Paul Brown Stadium against Miami (Ohio).

UK's home opener came against Central Michigan on Sept. 10. UK last took on the Chippewas in 2006 ... The annual game against in-state rival Louisville was Sept. 17 ... Kentucky's SEC slate started on Sept. 24 at home vs. Florida ... LSU replaced Auburn as the rotating SEC opponent. The Wildcats' last game at LSU was in 2006 ... UK's open date was Oct. 15, the exact midpoint of the schedule ... On Oct. 22, UK began a three-game homestand with Homecoming foe Jacksonville State, followed by Mississippi State and Ole Miss. It was UK's first game against Jacksonville State, which gained notoriety last season for knocking off Ole Miss in Oxford.

SPECIAL FORCES

An admirer of the United States military, Joker Phillips hopes to emulate the military's discipline, teamwork and efficiency with the Wildcats, most notably on special teams, which Phillips has renamed "Special Forces."

Here are some notes about the "Special Forces" from the 2010 season:

- Senior Ryan Tydlacka returns as the starting punter after averaging 43.8 yards per punt in 2010. Tydlacka was named the National Punter of the Week for the Ole Miss game after he launched a career-long 73-yard punt.
- Also returning for UK is junior field goal kicker Craig McIntosh, who finished the 2010 season second on the team in scoring with 67 points. The native of Lexington, Ky., made 11-of-15 field goals and 34-of-35 extra points. McIntosh made eight-consecutive field goals last season, which is the second-longest streak in school history.
- Matt Roark has used his 6-foot-6 height advantage to be a force on special teams. Roark has blocked six kicks during his career, including five extra points and a field goal. His six blocked kicks ranks him second all-time in UK history.

GAMEDAY READY IN AFRICA

Seven people affiliated with University of Kentucky Athletics - Athletic Director Mitch Barnhart and wife Connie, Head Football Coach Joker Phillips and wife Leslie, Associate AD Jason Schlafer, and football players Stuart Hines and Danny Trevathan - spent a week doing a service trip to Ethiopia. They visited orphanages, did work projects, distributed food and athletic equipment, etc.

The experience was a once-in-a-lifetime chance for Hines and Trevathan, who both said the trip was life-changing.

The trip was part of Phillips' Gameday Ready Tour initiative, which made five in-state stops in the summer of 2010 and two in-state stops this summer. In all, Phillips has held the fun and interactive tour stops in Hyden, Central City, Danville, Louisville, Franklin, Pikeville and Covington.

It's A WILDCAT STATE

Kentucky is often referred to as a "basketball state," given the fact that UK arguably is the greatest men's basketball program in collegiate history.

However, we like to think of Kentucky as a "Wildcat state" because of the tremendous overall support for UK athletics. In 2010-11, Kentucky was one of only five schools to rank in the nation's top 25 in attendance for football, men's basketball and women's basketball.

In addition, Kentucky has ranked in the nation's top 25 in football attendance 11 years since Commonwealth Stadium was expanded in 1999. On game day, Commonwealth Stadium usually becomes the third-largest city in Kentucky.

And, over the years, one would be hard-pressed to find a school with the ups-and-downs of Kentucky football, yet has the solid bedrock of support enjoyed by the Wildcat gridders. For example, contrast Kentucky with other institutions from so-called "basketball states." Kentucky, Kansas, North Carolina, Duke and Indiana rank 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, and 12th (respectively) in all-time college basketball victories. Here is the average attendance for those schools in the 2010 football season:

Lewellen is one of only 11 players from the NCAA Football Bowl Subdivision honored for his work in the community. Lewellen has participated in numerous activities, most notably his service trip to Nicaragua during the 2010 spring break and he also organized a supply drive for victims of the 2011 tornado that struck Joplin, Mo. After spearheading the collection effort, Lewellen personally drove the supplies to Joplin, then stayed to help with the cleanup work.

Kentucky has had 11 players named to the national good works team over the years, ranking third all-time among FBS schools.

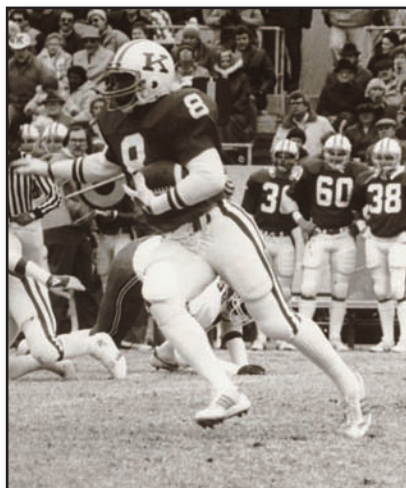

KENTUCKY 14, WESTERN KENTUCKY 3

SEPT. 1, 2011



Behind the first career rushing touchdown from freshman tailback Josh Clemons and junior La'Rod King's seventh career receiving touchdown, the University of Kentucky football team claimed its fifth-consecutive season opener, taking down in-state foe Western Kentucky University 14-3 at LP Field in Nashville, Tenn.

The win extended Kentucky's school-record regular-season non-conference winning streak to 20 games and also kept UK undefeated against WKU all-time, moving to 3-0 in series history. Although a home game for WKU, the game was played at LP Field in Nashville, the home of the Tennessee Titans.

The Wildcats had an impressive defensive performance under new co-defensive coordinator Rick Minter, limiting WKU to 93 passing yards and only 234 yards of total offense. Kentucky's defense surrendered only three points to the Hilltoppers, while racking up four interceptions in one game for the first time since 2005.

Individually, Kentucky was led defensively by seniors Danny Trevathan, Winston Guy and Ronnie Sneed, who each posted double-figure tackles. Trevathan paced the Wildcats with 13, while Guy had 10 tackles and two interceptions and Sneed earned a career-best 10 stops and also had a pickoff.

WKU opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 41-yard field goal by Casey Tinius. In the second quarter, the UK offense was sparked by Guy's first interception of the game, leading to Clemons' 14-yard touchdown run to give the Wildcats a lead they would not relinquish.

After both defenses dominated play in the third quarter, Kentucky put the game away with a key touchdown with less than five minutes remaining in the fourth quarter. Facing third-and-long deep in his own territory, UK quarterback Morgan Newton rushed up the middle for 58 yards for a pivotal first down. Two plays later, Newton hit King on a beautiful pass in the corner of the endzone to propel the Wildcats to a 14-3 victory.

KENTUCKY 27, CENTRAL MICHIGAN 13

SEPT. 10, 2011



Kentucky used another second-half shutout from its defense and scored 24 unanswered points, including an 87-yard touchdown run by freshman Josh Clemons, to win its sixth-consecutive home opener in a 27-13 victory over Central Michigan at Commonwealth Stadium.

The Wildcats' defense was solid for the second-consecutive game, limiting Central Michigan to less than 100 yards rushing and earning two interceptions. UK was led by linebacker Danny Trevathan, who notched 13 tackles, including three tackles for loss, plus an interception. Safety/linebacker Winston Guy also had 13 tackles and safety Martavius Neloms posted 10 stops.

The Chippewas jumped out to an early lead in the game, taking the opening drive down the field for a David Harman 19-yard field goal.

After Kentucky tied the score at 3-3 by a 41-yard field goal from Craig McIntosh, Central Michigan scored 10 straight points to take a 13-3 lead behind a touchdown reception from Jerry Harris and another field goal from Harman.

Kentucky tacked on another field goal before halftime, this time a 45-yarder from McIntosh before rattling off 21 unanswered points.

After both teams punted twice to start the second half, Kentucky swung the momentum in its direction by stopping CMU on fourth-and-inches in its own territory. On the next play, UK quarterback Morgan Newton rifled a 34-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver La'Rod King, tying the game at 13-13.

On Kentucky's next possession, UK true freshman running back Josh Clemons ran into a pile in the middle of the field, then broke away to his right and raced to the end zone for an 87-yard touchdown. It is the longest run in school history by a Wildcat freshman and the fourth-longest run in school history. The dash gave the Wildcats a lead they wouldn't relinquish. UK put the game away on its next drive, marching 85 yards down the field before Newton rushed for a one-yard touchdown to go up 27-13.

LOUISVILLE 24, KENTUCKY 17

SEPT. 17, 2011



Kentucky put together a late rally but came up short in a comeback effort against in-state rival Louisville, falling 24-17 at Commonwealth Stadium. The win for Louisville marked the first time since 2007 that Kentucky did not win the battle for the Governor's Cup.

The game started with the Wildcats marching down the field to the Louisville two-yard line before the Cardinals' defense stiffened and held the Wildcats to a 20-yard field goal by junior Craig McIntosh. Late in the quarter, Louisville gained the lead it would not relinquish when starting quarterback Will Stein connected on a 38-yard touchdown pass to Andrell Smith to give the Cardinals a 7-3 lead.

U of L tacked on seven more points with just over a minute to go in the first half when Teddy Bridgewater, who replaced the injured Stein at quarterback, completed a 25-yard touchdown pass to DeVante Parker.

Kentucky and quarterback Morgan Newton responded before the half ended, taking the ball 80 yards down the field and cutting the U of L lead to 14-10 when King caught a 15-yard touchdown pass from Newton with 10 seconds remaining in the half.

Louisville received the opening kickoff of the second half and put three points on the board to take its lead back to seven when Chris Philpott connected from 20 yards out.

The Cardinals took a 24-10 lead with just over 11 minutes remaining in the game when Bridgewater hit Josh Bellamy for a 25-yard touchdown pass.

UK began its comeback effort on the next drive, getting a two-yard touchdown pass from Newton to wide receiver E.J. Fields to cut the lead in half. After U of L went three-and-out on its next possession, Kentucky started a would-be game tying drive before losing the ball on downs at the Louisville 18-yard line.

#15 FLORIDA 48, KENTUCKY 10

The No. 15 Florida Gators used a capable rushing attack and opportunistic defense in defeating Kentucky 48-10 at Commonwealth Stadium.

The Gators racked up 520 yards of total offense in the game, including 405 yards on the ground en route to the victory. Jeff Demps paced the Gator attack with 10 rushes for 157 yards and two touchdowns, while Chris Rainey added 105 yards and Trey Burton and Mike Gillislee each had rushing touchdowns. The Gator defense generated four turnovers, all of which eventually produced points.

The Wildcats managed to frustrate the Gators early on in the game as the Gators went three-and-out on the first drive for just the fourth time all season, and UK forced a Florida punt in the second drive.

But a fumble by the Wildcats provided the burst of energy Florida needed as the Gators took over at the Kentucky 45, and John Brantley hit Gerald Christian on a 45-yard touchdown pass across the middle on the next play to give the Gators a 7-0 lead with 8:10 in the first quarter.

Florida got two more scores in the first quarter when Demps busted a 20-yard touchdown run to make it 14-0 and then Burton punched in a score from the one-yard line. Kentucky responded with a 69-yard drive, capped by a 24-yard field goal from Craig McIntosh to end the opening period behind 21-3.

In the second quarter, Florida's offense received help from its defense when Jaye Howard grabbed a fumble and returned it for a score. Late in the quarter, Kentucky linebacker Danny Trevathan forced and recovered a fumble in Florida territory. Two plays later, Morgan Newton hit La'Rod King for a 19-yard touchdown reception – his fourth consecutive game with a touchdown catch – to make the score 31-10 at halftime.

Kentucky moved the ball well in the second half, moving into Florida territory on four possessions, but were unable to capitalize with points.

#1/2 LSU 35, KENTUCKY 7

OCT. 1, 2011



The No. 1-ranked Louisiana State University Tigers used their swift, physical defense to keep their unblemished record intact by taking down the University of Kentucky 35-7 in a rare morning kickoff at Tiger Stadium in front of 92,660.

The Tigers' defense limited UK to 155 yards of total offense, including 89 rushing yards and 66 passing yards. The Kentucky defense also performed well, keeping LSU under 200 yards rushing and receiving in the game, including limiting LSU to only 14 points in the first half. LSU started the scoring in the opening quarter, putting together a 12-play, 68-yard drive that ended in a one-yard touchdown rush by Jordan Jefferson. The Tigers put seven more points on the board with 11 minutes to go in the half when quarterback Jarrett Lee connected with Odell

Beckham for a 51-yard touchdown reception.

In the third quarter, LSU put together a 10-play, 68-yard drive that ended with an Alfred Blue one-yard touchdown rush, giving the top-ranked Tigers a 21-0 lead. On Kentucky's next offensive set, Tyrann Mathieu forced a fumble and then picked up the loose ball and took it 23 yards for a touchdown to give LSU a 28-0 lead.

Kentucky got on the board with just over four minutes to go in the fourth quarter when Morgan Newton connected with Matt Roark for a four-yard touchdown reception, capping off a 12-play, 70-yard drive.

South Carolina used an explosive offensive attack and a suffocating defense to spoil the University of Kentucky football team's chances of a second-consecutive upset over the ranked Gamecocks by taking down the Wildcats 54-3 at Williams-Brice Stadium in Columbia, S.C.

Kentucky got on the board first after sophomore Avery Williamson caused USC return man Bruce Ellington to fumble the opening kickoff of the game, which the Wildcats recovered deep in South Carolina territory. Six plays later, Kentucky's Craig McIntosh drilled a 28-yard field goal to give Kentucky the 3-0 lead.

The Gamecocks responded in a big way behind an impressive performance by quarterback Conner Shaw. Shaw completed 26-of-39 passes for 311 yards and four touchdowns, while four Gamecocks had touchdown receptions

and two others had rushing TDs.

South Carolina led 20-3 going into the half after Shaw and star wide receiver Alshon Jeffery connected on 20- and 24-yard touchdown receptions, while Shaw and Justice Cunningham hooked up on an 11-yard pass. Kentucky's Matt Roark took one USC point off the board when he blocked an extra point. It was the seventh blocked kick of Roark's career, tying the school record.

The second half was much of the same, with USC scoring four touchdowns and two field goals en route to the victory. Shaw threw for his fourth touchdown on the afternoon on South Carolina's first drive of the third quarter, finding Nick Jones for a 25-yard scoring strike to give the Gamecocks a 27-3 lead at the 8:46 mark.

After Jay Wooten made field goal attempts of 48 and 42 yards to push the Gamecocks' lead to 33-3, Ellington put an exclamation point on the win with a 61-yard touchdown run with 10:34 left in the fourth quarter. The Gamecocks added two more scores late in the contest.

Morgan Newton had 54 yards rushing on 14 carries to lead the Wildcats. Winston Guy tallied 14 tackles in a solid defensive effort, while Danny Trevathan contributed 13 stops for Kentucky.

KENTUCKY 38, JACKSONVILLE STATE 14

OCT. 22, 2011



After a much needed bye week, Kentucky returned to its winning ways with an impressive performance on both sides of the ball, taking down FCS powerhouse Jacksonville State 38-14 in its final non-conference game of the season at Commonwealth Stadium.

UK, which scored a season-high 38 points in the game, performed very well offensively against the Gamecocks, totaling a season-best 445 yards of total offense. The Wildcats gained 340 on the ground, which was its most since earning 341 against Vanderbilt in November of 2010.

Junior tailback CoShik Williams led the way with a career-best 148 rushing yards, while junior wide receiver La'Rod King eclipsed 1,000 receiving yards in his career with five catches for 84 yards and two touchdowns. Starting quarterback Morgan Newton capped off the good offensive night with a career-high 75 rushing yards, including a TD, and going 10-of-16 passing for 105 yards and two touchdowns.

However, it was the Kentucky defense started the scoring when safety Martavius Neloms sacked the JSU quarterback, causing a fumble which he scooped and returned 40 yards for a touchdown. It was Kentucky's first fumble return for a touchdown since Ventrell Jenkins' famed game-winning stiff-arm 56-yard return in the 2009 AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

UK never looked back after gaining the lead, scoring on its next three possessions to end the first half. Newton and King connected for the first of two touchdowns on the Wildcats' next drive with a 29-yard touchdown reception, increasing UK's lead to 14-0.

After a one-yard Newton touchdown rush, Jacksonville State answered with its lone offensive touchdown of the game when quarterback Coty Blanchard connected with Alan Bonner from 22 yards. With 2:28 to go in the half, Kentucky marched down the field and came away with a 27-yard field goal from Craig McIntosh to take a 24-7 lead into halftime.

Both teams were held scoreless in the third quarter, before a Danny Trevathan interception set up a six-yard TD pass from Newton to King. On the ensuing kickoff, Gamecocks' return man Gabriel Chambers returned the kick for a touchdown to keep JSU within striking distance of the Wildcats.

After a Luke McDermott interception, running back Jonathan George sealed the win for Kentucky when he rushed the ball in from eight yards out with 6:40 to go in the game.

MISSISSIPPI STATE 28, KENTUCKY 16

OCT. 29, 2011



After a momentum-building win the week before against Jacksonville State, the University of Kentucky football could not keep its winning habits, falling to Southeastern Conference foe Mississippi State 28-16 at Commonwealth Stadium.

Mississippi State quarterbacks Tyler Russell and Chris Relf rotated during the game and combined for 264 passing yards and each threw for a touchdown. UK also used multiple quarterbacks after starter Morgan Newton suffered a right ankle sprain in the first quarter and did not return. Freshman Maxwell Smith replaced him and finished 26-of-33 for 174 yards.

After UK forced a MSU fumble on its first drive of the game, leading to a Craig McIntosh field goal and a 3-0 UK lead, Mississippi State drive 80 yards down the field in eight plays and 2:13 to take a lead they would not relinquish. The Bulldogs scored again on their next possession as Relf ran the ball in from three-yards out to put MSU up 14-3.

Kentucky again recovered an MSU fumble deep in its own territory and get another field goal from McIntosh, this one from 22-yards out. MSU with a four-play, 80-yard drive to take a 21-6 lead into the half.

Kentucky forced Mississippi State to go three-and-out to start the second half and tacked on three points on the ensuing possession when McIntosh nailed a 35-yard field goal with 8:13 to go in the third quarter. MSU answered the UK score with another 80-yard touchdown drive, capped by a 13-yard strike from Russell to Malcolm Johnson, to give MSU its biggest lead at 28-9.

Behind solid play by Smith, UK would put together some impressive drives late in the game, including a 11-play, 70-yard touchdown drive early in the fourth quarter behind a four-yard touchdown run by Jonathan George to cut the lead to 28-16. On UK's next possession, Smith led the Wildcats on another drive and he converted on third downs in the air three times on the drive. But his fourth-and-7 pass from the Mississippi State 8-yard line with just under five minutes was incomplete, ending UK's comeback effort.

Smith's primary target during the game was wide receiver Matt Roark, who posted career highs with 13 catches for 116 yards, tying for the second-most receptions in a game in school history. Linebacker Danny Trevathan paced the defense with a career-high-tying 17 tackles, along with an interception and a forced fumble that was recovered by the Wildcats.

Kentucky posted 20 unanswered points in the fourth quarter en route to a come-from-behind 30-13 win over Southeastern Conference foe Ole Miss at Commonwealth Stadium.

Kentucky was led in the game offensively by true freshman quarterback Maxwell Smith, who started in place of the injured Morgan Newton, and junior tailback CoShik Williams. Smith completed 19 of 38 passes for 283 yards and two touchdowns, while Williams rushed 25 times for 111 yards and two TDs. UK also had two receivers over the 100-yard mark with senior Matt Roark posting seven catches for 116 yards and junior La'Rod King making three catches for 102 yards.

The game started with Ole Miss connecting two field goals from Bryson Rose, giving the Rebels a 6-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. Williams started the UK scor-

ing on the first play of the second quarter with a two-yard touchdown rush to give UK a 7-6 lead. UK increased its lead to 10-6 at halftime with a 48-yard field goal by Craig McIntosh that was set up by an interception by Danny Trevathan.

After Kentucky punted on the opening possession of the second half, Ole Miss pieced together an impressive 12-play, 72-yard touchdown drive that ended with a 21-yard pass from Randall Mackey to Nickolas Brassell to give Ole Miss a 13-10 lead.

But, the Cats responded in the fourth quarter with three touchdowns. Smith completed his first career TD pass on a gorgeous throw and catch to King from 38 yards away.

McIntosh missed the extra point, keeping the game at 16-13.

Kentucky put the game away with two late touchdowns. Smith hit King down the sideline for a career-long 55 yard pass to the Ole Miss six-yard line. Two plays later, junior wide receiver Gene McCaskill earned his first career touchdown on an eight-yard reception to give UK the 23-13 lead. Williams tacked on another touchdown under a minute to go in the game on a 10-yard run after Ole Miss turned the ball over on downs.

Defensively, Danny Trevathan led the way for Kentucky, tying a career high in tackles for the second-consecutive game with 17 stops, while UK posted a season-high 10 tackles for loss.
