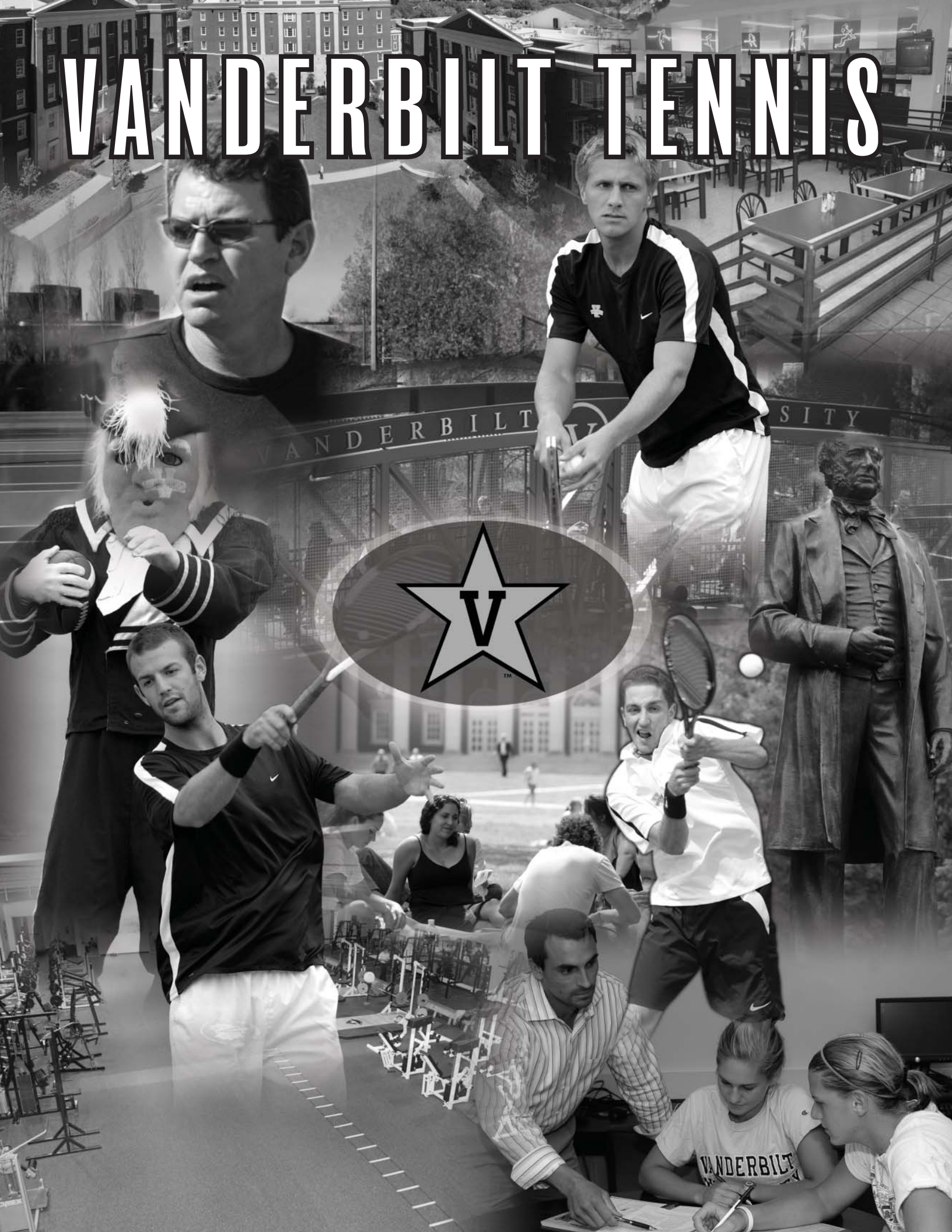

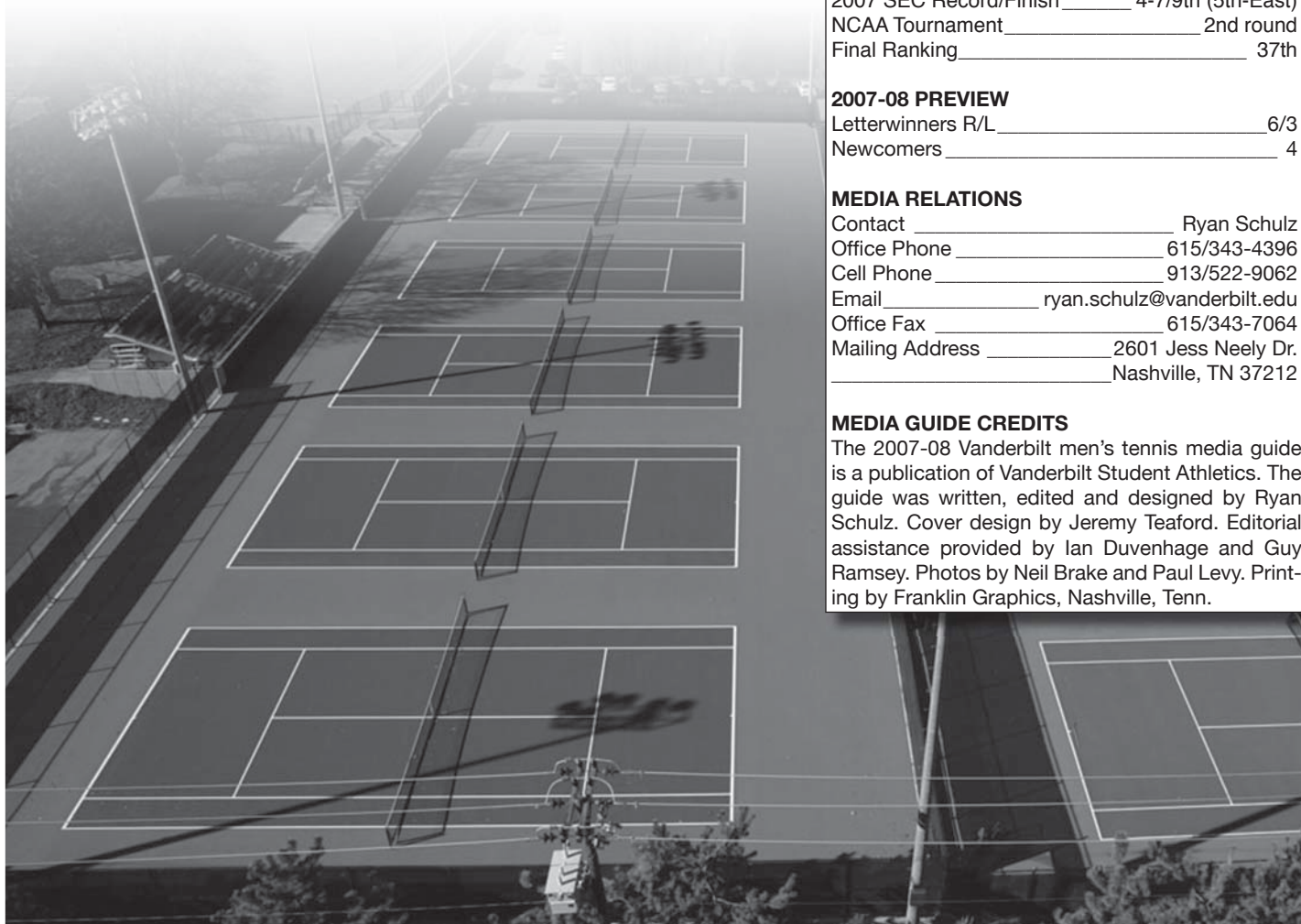

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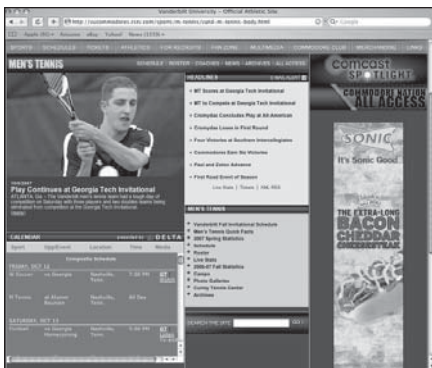

SEASON OUTLOOK

With the return of its top four players from a team that advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with an upset over No. 18 Tulsa, the Vanderbilt men's tennis team is poised to take an even bigger leap this season.

Led by third-year head coach Ian Duvenhage, the Commodores finished the 2006-07 season with a No. 37 ranking and 11-13 overall record after advancing to the NCAA Tournament for the sixth time the past seven seasons.

Last season's success at the NCAA Tournament has the Commodores brimming with excitement for the 2007-08 campaign.

"I think having the opportunity to play in the NCAA Tournament was huge," Duvenhage said. "We have our top four players from last year back and the experience they gained from the NCAA Tournament was invaluable. I also think that winning a first round match against a top-20 team (Tulsa) really showed us that not only are we capable of doing it, but I think it changes expectations for this year."

Entering the year with an 18-27 record in two seasons at Vanderbilt and an overall mark of 370-197 in 22 seasons of coaching college tennis, Duvenhage is quick to point out that the process of building the foundation of the program for a long line of success is the priority over the number of wins and losses this season.

"Our whole program is very process oriented," Duvenhage said. "We don't get bogged down with results very much. I believe in the hare and the tortoise metaphor in that I think you have to avoid taking detours and regressing. I do believe that if the process is right then the results take care of themselves."

"When I came here two years ago, I did so because I felt that this is a program that can be in the top 20 year in and year out and in the top 10 often."

In order for the Commodores to take that next step as a program, they must overcome any of the hiccups that may arise with seven out of the 10 players on the team being underclassmen. The only upperclassmen on the team are seniors Ryan Preston and Evan Dufaux and junior Nick Cromydas.

Despite the youth, Duvenhage believes this year's team is more experienced than last year's having advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

"Oddly enough, I think we are going to be a much more experienced team than we were last year in spite of how young we are," Duvenhage said. "I think the returning guys have a much better idea of what this is all about and what it takes to be successful at this level."

"I'm a very big believer that on mature teams, most of the teaching that oc-

curs happens through your upperclassmen and experienced leaders and I think those guys will be able to point the younger guys in the right direction."

Duvenhage and assistant coach Tom Boysen are already seeing the dividends on the practice court from last season's success.

"I'm still doing exactly what I did last year, but in addition to Tom's and my teaching, there is now the added component of our experienced players teaching the younger players," Duvenhage said. "I'm not terribly concerned about our youth."

On the court, the Commodores will be led by Preston, who is a two-time All-SEC selection. Last year, the Northbrook, Ill., native finished the season ranked No. 53 with a 15-17 record after playing the year as VU's No. 1 player. Preston also advanced to the NCAA Singles Championships for the second straight season.

"I know that Ryan (Preston) will tell you that he was very dissatisfied with the year he had last year," Duvenhage said. "I have no doubt that he is going to have a great year. I've seen some things happen in practice that I think are tremendously positive. He is definitely one of the best players in college tennis and I think he is going to have a great year."

Adding senior leadership with Preston will be Evan Dufaux, who had three wins that clinched matches last season. Dufaux's clinching victories came against Auburn, at Arkansas and against Tulsa in the NCAA Tournament.

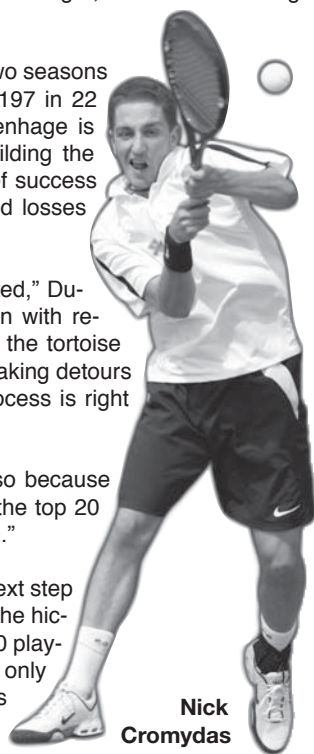
Helping to lead the Commodores on the court with Preston and Dufaux will be junior Nick Cromydas. A native of Glenview, Ill., Cromydas played last season at the No. 2 position for Vanderbilt and finished the year ranked 122nd. Cromydas also pieced together an overall record of 16-13.

"Nick made such a huge jump after his freshman year," Duvenhage said. "He played Nos. 5 and 6 for us as a freshman and for him to move all the way up to No. 2 in the lineup and have a good year for us was very impressive. He was very close to having a sensational year. He is a great competitor with great instincts on the court and he knows how to win. The main thing for him as it is for everyone is that I just want him to continue to progress."

In addition to the stellar play of Preston and Cromydas, sophomore Vijay Paul also had a strong freshman campaign and Duvenhage believes he is on the cusp of elevating his game to another level.

"Vijay had a great year last season," Duvenhage said. "He went 8-3 in the SEC last year, but he needs to continue to grow. Just doing that again would not be progress. I'm looking for him to continue his progress."

In addition to Cromydas, Dufaux, Paul and Preston,

the Commodores also return sophomores Scott Lieberman and James Moye.

"While Scott (Lieberman) didn't play a lot last season," Duvenhage said, "we still feel he is a very talented player and we hope he brings that talent to fruition this year."

"James (Moye) got a chance to play in some big matches last year and I'm hoping his experience of playing last season is something he can build on for this year."

Joining the six returning letterwinners is a talented freshmen class comprised of Adam Baker, Andy Pulido, Bryant Salcedo and Alex Zotov.

Making the largest impact so far has been Salcedo, a native of Boardman, Ohio.

"In the first few weeks of practice, Bryant (Salcedo) has showed that he can compete for the No. 1 position on the team," Duvenhage said. For a freshman to come in and do that says a lot."

A local product from Montgomery Bell Academy in Nashville, Baker has also caught the eye of the Vanderbilt head coach.

"I knew that he was going to contribute and knew that he was going to be a really good college tennis player, but I guess if there has been a surprise it is how quickly it has happened," Duvenhage said. "He literally is improving by the day. He is going to make a huge dif-

ference and contribute significantly.

"I think he is the quintessential college player because he is unique in that in high school he played baseball and basketball, so he understands the team concept better than most tennis players."

Also making an immediate impact has been the play of Pulido, who hails from Texarkana, Texas.

"Andy (Pulido) has also been a surprise," Duvenhage said. "Mechanically, he is sound. I like his energy and his intensity and athleticism but he has also exceeded my expectations to this point. I thought he was going to be a year away and he is much closer than I expected him to be."

Rounding out Vanderbilt's freshman class is Zotov, who is the Commodores lone international player. Zotov is a native of Minsk, Belarus.

"We've seen so far that Alex is a much better match player than practice player," Duvenhage said. "He is very tough in matches and knows how to win. He still needs to make improvement to his game, but his competitive skills have been superb."

Having experienced the taste of postseason success last season, the Commodores are hungrier than ever entering this season.

"I think the biggest strength of the team is desire," Duvenhage said. "I've never had a group of people that want it more than these guys."

"I felt we improved significantly from year one last year. When the year is over, I'd like to look back at it and say, 'We progressed significantly from year two to year three.'"

IAN DUVENHAGE

Head Coach • 3rd Season

In just two seasons at the helm of Vanderbilt's men's tennis program, head coach Ian Duvenhage has quickly shaped the Commodores into a nationally ranked program.

After finishing 7-14 overall and 2-10 in the Southeastern Conference in 2006, Duvenhage guided the Commodores to the second round of the NCAA Tournament



with an upset of No. 18 Tulsa in 2007. In addition to taking Vanderbilt to the second round of the NCAA Tournament, Duvenhage led the Commodores to a No. 37 ranking, while improving VU's record to 11-13 overall and 4-7 in the SEC.

A veteran coach with 26 years of coaching experience, including 22 years coaching in the college ranks, Duvenhage, 48, quickly elevated the play of Vanderbilt's players. In his first two seasons, Duvenhage has helped senior Ryan Preston earn two consecutive first team All-SEC honors after guiding him from the No. 5 singles slot in 2005 to the No. 1 slot in 2006.

Similar to the success experienced by Preston, Duvenhage helped junior Nick Cromydas climb from the Nos. 5 and 6 singles positions as a freshman to the No. 2 slot as a sophomore in 2007.

Both Preston and Cromydas finished last season in the final ITA singles rankings. Preston was ranked 53rd, while Cromydas checked in at No. 122.

Hired on June 23, 2005, Duvenhage is the fourth men's tennis head coach since the program began in 1981.

Duvenhage's resume includes a 370-197 collegiate record, including an 18-27 mark in two seasons in Nashville. His 22-year college head coaching career includes 13 years at Florida and seven at his alma mater, the University of Miami. Duvenhage's impressive resume also includes one NCAA runner-up finish, two NCAA third-place finishes, four NCAA final eight appearances, and fifteen appearances in the NCAA sweet sixteen.

The native of Kuruman, South Africa, came to America through a tennis scholarship from the University of Miami. By the time he graduated with his M.B.A. in 1983, Duvenhage boasted a 52-17 career record, competed in the NCAA singles championship his junior year and won a USTA doubles title with partner Michael Robertson in 1983.

Duvenhage served as head coach of the Miami women's tennis program from 1982 through 1988 and led the team to a 131-44 record with a .749 winning percentage. The Hurricanes participated in post season NCAA play all seven seasons of Duvenhage's campaign and were ranked in the national top five for four seasons.

In 1985 the Hurricanes saw one of their most successful seasons in team history when they competed in the NCAA finals and were ranked second in the nation. Duvenhage followed

up the '85 season by leading Ronni Reis and Lise Gregory to the NCAA doubles team NCAA Championship and winning the Wilson intercollegiate Coach of Year award in 1986.

In 1988 Duvenhage signed on with the University of Florida and began his thirteen-year reign with the Gators. From 1991 through 2000, the Florida men's tennis team became one of only three schools to finish in the national top 16 for nine consecutive years in addition to winning two SEC titles. Duvenhage also coached four Gator national champions, 1993 NCAA doubles champions Mark Merklien and Dave Blair, 1994 NCAA singles winner Merklien, and 1999 singles winner Jeff Morrison.

Duvenhage received tremendous praise for his work with the Florida tennis squad. In 1991 Duvenhage earned the Co-Region 3 ITCA Wilson Coach of the Year award. In 2000, Duvenhage received the Region 3 Coach of the Year Award and Daily Tennis National Coach of the Year Award. In addition, the Gator coach received the highly competitive SEC Coach of the Year Award three times (1993, 1994, and 2000). Duvenhage has also served as coach of the USTA National Collegiate Team in 1999, 2001 and 2004.

In 2001, after thirteen years with the University of Florida, Duvenhage bid farewell to the Gators to pursue coaching on the professional tour. Duvenhage coached Jeff Morrison through matches at Wimbledon, the French Open, the Australian Open, the US Open and many other ATP events. As Morrison's personal coach on tour for three years, Duvenhage coached him against players such as Roger Federer, Andy Roddick, James Blake, Juan Carlos Ferrero, Arnaud Clement, Paradorn Srichaphan, Mikhail Youzhny, Mardy Fish, Taylor Dent, Nicolas Massu, Wayne Ferreira, Vincent Spadea, Ian Ljubicic and Yevgeny Kafelnikov. Against those players, Duvenhage helped Morrison earn wins over nine of them.

During his time coaching athletes on the professional tour, Duvenhage took advantage of his increased amount of free time to work on his other interests, including his love of oil painting.

In 2005 Duvenhage was ready to get back into the intense lifestyle of a Division I coach and snagged the opportunity when it became available at Vanderbilt.

Born Jan. 10, 1959, Duvenhage currently resides in Nashville with his wife Susan Duvenhage and three family dogs.

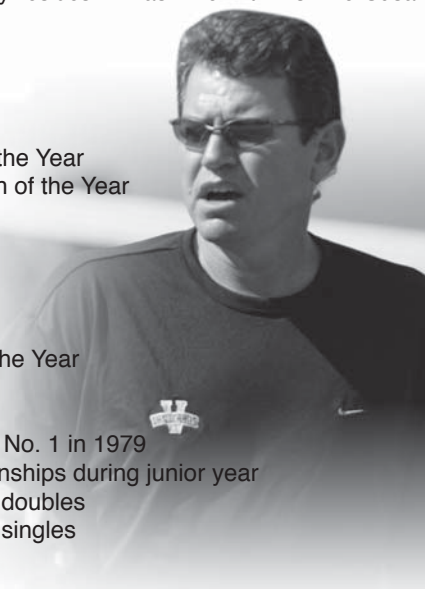

TOM BOYSEN

Assistant Coach • 3rd Season

Hired in August of 2005, Tom Boysen is entering his third season as assistant coach at Vanderbilt. A long time Florida resident, Boysen has more than a decade of coaching experience, including three years mentoring on the professional circuit prior to joining Vanderbilt's staff.

In his two seasons working with head coach Ian Duvenhage, Boysen has helped shape Vanderbilt into a nationally ranked program. Just last season, Boysen helped the Commodores advance to the second round of the NCAA Tournament with an upset of No. 18 Tulsa.

In addition to taking the Commodores to the NCAA Tournament, Boysen helped VU to a No. 37 ranking, while improving VU's record from 7-14 in 2006 to 11-13 in 2007. The Commodores' record in the Southeastern Conference has also improved from 2-10 in 2006 to 4-7 in 2007.

Boysen got into coaching tennis by teaching all ages at the club level. Eventually, Boysen found his niche with young adults and began coaching national caliber juniors. Boysen worked with several national standouts, including Lauren Kalvaria who ranked third in the nation and attended Stanford on scholarship.

Working mostly in Florida, Boysen's work with the state's most talented young athletes led him to meet current Vanderbilt head coach Ian Duvenhage, who was formerly at the helm of the University of Florida's men's tennis team.

Following his junior coaching tenure, Boysen traveled around the world working with professional athletes. One of Boysen's most successful students was Todd Widom, who ranked as high as 200 on the ATP charts and competed in three US Open Qualifying draws.



Boysen also coached Scott Lipsky and David Martin to numerous Challenger and Futures doubles titles. In 2007, Lipsky and Martin reached the round of 16 in doubles at Wimbledon, the semis and Newport and finals at the Countrywide Classic in Los Angeles.



After three years on the circuit, Boysen was ready to try his hand at collegiate level coaching. Boysen had been eyeing the opening at Vanderbilt before he got the call from Duvenhage.

"I knew about the academic standards," Boysen said. "It was my goal to coach at a school with a good athletic reputation but also a good academic reputation. I knew I wanted to be associated with a great university and a coach who had a reputation for not only putting together a program, but also maintaining a top program."

Duvenhage quickly inked Boysen after learning of his intentions to make the switch to the collegiate level.

"I'm just absolutely thrilled to have someone of Tom's ability and stature on our staff," Duvenhage said. "I have enormous respect for his coaching ability on the court in the heat of the battle. He is very even keeled, he doesn't get rattled or nervous. He has a calming effect on the players and he gets his ideas across in a very clear, concise manner."

As a youngster, Boysen began participating in team athletics through basketball and cross country. But growing up in Florida, it wasn't long before Boysen discovered tennis through fellow classmates.

"Up to that point I had only played team sports. I really fell in love with the individual aspect of the game," Boysen said.

A 1992 graduate of Central Florida with a degree in management, Boysen was also a member of the Knights' tennis program. During his time at UCF, Boysen began coaching at a country club and received an offer to teach fulltime upon graduation.

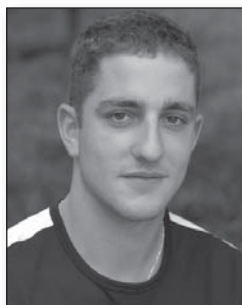

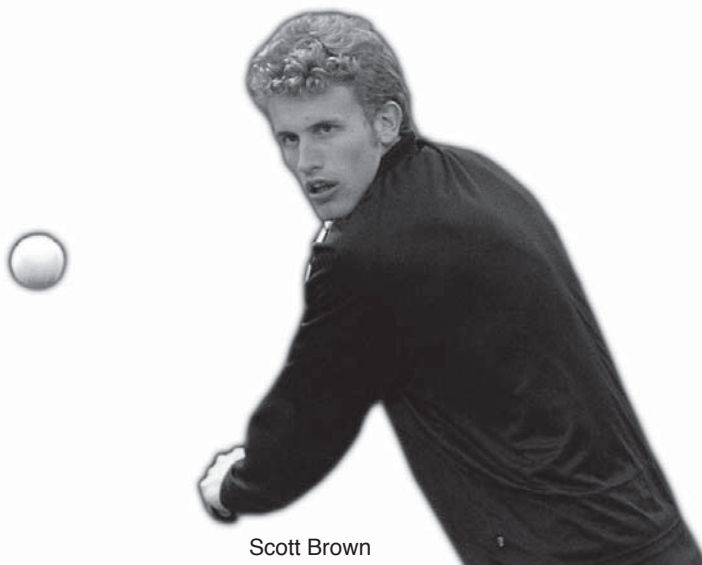

1999: The Commodores made their NCAA Tournament debut in 1999. They were sent to Champaign, Ill., as the second-seeded team at the NCAA Regional. Vanderbilt defeated third-seeded Michigan, 4-3, before falling to host Illinois, the seventh-ranked team in the nation, 4-2.

2001: After a one-year absence, Vanderbilt returned to the tourney in 2001, traveling to an NCAA Regional in College Station, Texas. The Commodores won their first round match, upsetting Arizona State, 4-1, but were unable to knock off host Texas A&M, falling to the No. 4 Aggies, 4-0.

2002: The 'Dores returned to the NCAA's for the second consecutive season in 2002, traveling to Lexington, Ky., for the NCAA Regional. Vanderbilt avenged a regular-season loss to Ohio State, defeating the Buckeyes, 4-3, to advance. In the second round, however, eighth-ranked host Kentucky defeated the 'Dores, 4-3.

2003: After three unsuccessful attempts at advancing past the second round of the NCAA Tournament away from Nashville, the Commodores earned the right to host an NCAA Regional in 2003 and took advantage of the opportunity by beginning a record-breaking run. The Commodores defeated Tennessee Tech and No. 26 Pepperdine in the Music City before shipping off to Athens, Ga., for the NCAA National Tournament. There, Vanderbilt would take down No. 10 Texas A&M, No. 2 Baylor and No. 5 UCLA to advance to the NCAA Championship match. It was the furthest any group of Commodores had ever gone. And even though top-ranked Illinois ended Vanderbilt's dream season, 4-3, in a hotly-contested title match, the 'Dores had entered the national spotlight.

2004: In 2004, the Commodores found themselves once again facing top ranked Illinois in the final rounds of the NCAA tournament. For the second consecutive year the tournament's No. 1 seed, Illinois, bumped the 'Dores out of the contest. On their way to the quarterfinals, VU defeated Oregon in the first round and SEC foes Ole Miss and Georgia in the second and third rounds.

2005: Despite stellar performances by seniors Scott Brown and Matt Lockin, the Commodores were unable to continue past the second round in the NCAA tournament. The No. 38 Commodores upset the No. 28 Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets in round one, but fell to SEC tennis powerhouse Florida in round two.

2007: Under the guidance of second-year coach Ian Duvenhage, Vanderbilt returned to the NCAA Tournament in 2007 with a 4-2 upset win over No. 18 Tulsa. Ranked No. 45, Vanderbilt lost 4-0 in the second round to No. 15 LSU in Baton Rouge.



Commodore All-Americans



Bobby Reynolds 2002, 2003

In his three years with the Vanderbilt tennis squad, Bobby Reynolds fought his way to the top of the collegiate tennis rankings and helped lead the Commodores to their first ever NCAA Finals appearance. So it comes as no surprise that after just four years on the pro circuit, Reynolds has already created a buzz on the worldwide level over his powerful game.

Reynolds thrived from the beginning in the Vanderbilt environment, earning more than 20 singles wins his freshman year alone. As a sophomore, Reynolds took First Team All-SEC honors and finished the season ranked 15th in the nation. Reynolds wrapped up his collegiate career ranked No. 1 in the country following Vanderbilt's run to the NCAA Finals for the first time in school history. In addition, Reynolds became Vanderbilt's first two-time men's tennis All-American, with back-to-back honors in 2002 and 2003.



Since 2003, Reynolds has soared up the ATP charts, hitting a career high No. 92 in 2005 following his finals appearance at a \$50,000 USTA Challenger. That same year, Reynolds debuted at the US Open and advanced to the third round of the Australian Open, where he took his first career Grand Slam win over Spaniard Nicolas Pietrangeli, and followed up with an upset over No. 17 seed Andrei Pavel of Romania.

In 2006, Reynolds paired with tennis legend Andy Roddick to take the RCA Doubles Championship in July of 2006. The win marks Reynolds' best finish in the US Open series, and shot the duo up to No. 52 on the ATP doubles charts.

In 2007, Reynolds earned one tournament title in Naples, Fla., in April, while finishing runner-up twice and advancing to the semifinals three additional times.

Reynolds still holds six Vanderbilt records including Most Singles Wins (99), Best Singles Winning Percentage (73.9), Most Doubles Wins by a team (with Eddie Coates) (26), Season Wins (46), Season Winning Percentage (86.8), and Season Doubles Wins (26).



Chris Groer 1996

In 1996, Chris Groer became the first Vanderbilt tennis player to earn All-American honors in nearly half a century. The Knoxville, Tenn., native compiled a 12-4 singles record and went 8-2 in SEC action his senior year, qualifying for the NCAAs in both singles and doubles. Groer earned a final ITA ranking of No. 15 in singles.

Groer spent several years following his time with the Commodores touring on the pro circuit. Groer and doubles partner Andre Carlson went head to head with Andy Roddick and Brian Vahaly in 2003 in the semifinals of the International Series in Washington.

In 2000-2001 Groer served as Assistant Coach for Ole Miss, helping lead the Rebels to the SEC West title and a trip to the NCAA Sweet 16.



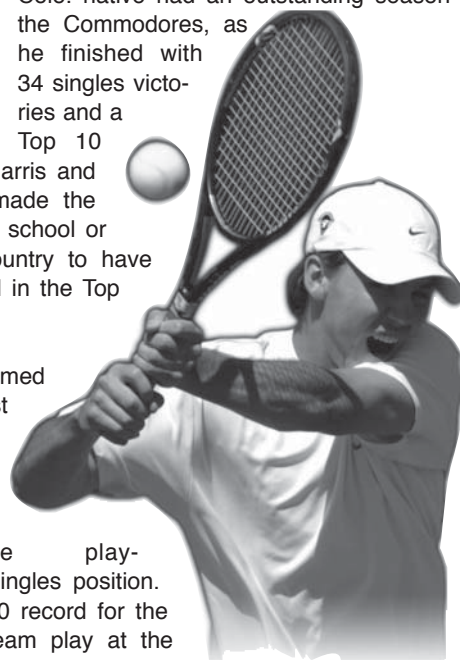
Chad Harris 2003

Chad Harris became Vanderbilt's third men's tennis All-American in 2003. The Aurora, Colo. native had an outstanding season for the Commodores, as he finished with 34 singles victories and a Top 10

national ranking. Harris and Bobby Reynolds made the Vanderbilt the only school or program in the country to have two players ranked in the Top 10.

Harris was also named to the All-SEC First Team in 2003, as he finished with the regular season with a 9-2 record while playing at the No. 2 singles position. Harris posted a 3-0 record for the Commodores in team play at the NCAA Tournament and was named to the NCAA All-Tournament team.

In 2004 and 2005, Harris participated in ten USA Futures events.

What do I do if I am going to miss class because of travel?

• Each student-athlete is instructed to give an official letter, supplied by The Stratton Foster Academic Center, to all of his or her professors with the dates and times, for the entire semester, they will miss class for athletically related travel. The counselors follow up this letter with an e-mail a week in advance, to serve as a reminder to the professors of his/her student-athletes who will not be in class.

When is the academic center open?

• The Stratton Foster Academic Center is open to every student-athlete on Sundays from 2:00pm-10:00pm, Mondays-Thursdays from 7:30am-10:00pm, and on Fridays from 7:30am-5:00pm. For quiet studying, thirty private study carrels are available in the bi-level facility. A computer lab is also conveniently located for student-athletes to write papers or do research while in The Stratton Foster Academic Center.



Brownlee O. Currey Jr. Tennis Center

The Brownlee O. Currey Jr. Tennis Center was completed in November 1993. With the opening of its doors, the Vanderbilt tennis program provides one of the finest tennis facilities in the nation for varsity collegiate tennis. It was selected to host men's NCAA Regional Tournament in 1993.

Plans for the new tennis center were unveiled in April 1993 when former Director of Athletics Paul Hoolahan announced that a \$2.2 million project was being made possible by the generous benefactors of Vanderbilt tennis. Nashville businessman Brownlee O. Currey Jr. spearheaded the fundraising for the project. Additional gifts were made by the Joe. C. Davis Foundation, the Fleming Foundation, Mrs. Joanne Fleming Hayes, and Mr. Kermit C. Stengel.

The previous tennis center, which had provided three indoor courts, underwent several changes throughout the renovation. A two-story, 16,000-square-foot addition was made to the existing indoor structure, providing enough space for five indoor courts.

The lower level of the facility houses spacious locker rooms for both varsity teams as well as a training room and locker room space for visitors.

A special feature of the center is a state-of-the-art audio/visual room, also located on the second floor. Small video cameras are mounted at the north end of each indoor playing court, allowing the coaches to monitor and record matches in progress on all five courts. The room also serves as a classroom for the coaches and their teams.

In addition to the changes and adaptations to the interior of the tennis center, the building was given an exterior face lift as well. Its new red-brick exterior now matches the architecture of many buildings on the Vanderbilt campus.

Outdoor Facility

The fundraising for the renovations of the outdoor tennis courts began in 2001, and five years later Vanderbilt tennis fans and athletes are thoroughly enjoying their world class facilities.

The \$5 million project was completed just in time for the beginning of the 2005 tennis season, when the team advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen for the seventh consecutive year.

The new outdoor complex at the Brownlee O. Currey Jr. Tennis Center includes nine lighted courts and seating for more than 1,000 spectators. The new facility also features concession areas and restrooms.

One of the more important factors in designing the new courts was that of comfort, both to coaches and players as well as fans. As a result the six varsity courts are side by side, so coaches can freely move to any court during a match. In addition, the court layout allows fans to enjoy a great view from any seat, including the various picnic tables around the courts.

The fan friendly design of the courts makes weekday afternoon matches a popular destination for students as well as Vanderbilt Athletic staff members located in the McGugin Center just a few yards away.

One of the most dazzling features of the new facility is its state-of-the-art lighting system. The courts house some of the most powerful lights on the market so matches can be easily televised at night.

The inaugural season of the outdoor facilities drew more fans out to support the Commodores due to the added comfort and accessibility.





Prospective Student-Athlete Information

Vanderbilt Mission Statement on NCAA Compliance

It is the goal of Vanderbilt University Athletic Department's Compliance Program to assist coaches and staff by developing and maintaining a compliance program that will educate, monitor and provide interpretations of NCAA and SEC rules.

Staff members, student-athletes and supporters of Vanderbilt Athletics are encouraged to consult with the compliance staff when clarification is needed.

Institutional Control & Compliance

Institutional control of athletics is a fundamental requirement of NCAA legislation. Specifically, the NCAA constitution provides that each institution should be responsible for:

- Controlling its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Association.
- Monitoring its programs to ensure compliance, identifying and reporting to the Association instances in which compliance has not been achieved and taking appropriate corrective actions.
- Insuring that members of the institution's staff, student-athletes and other individuals or groups representing the institution's athletics interests comply with all applicable Association rules.



Representatives of Athletics Interests (Boosters)

"A Representative of the Institution's Athletics Interest" (Booster) is an individual who is known (or should be known) by a member or members of the institution's executive or athletic administration to:

- Participate in or have been a member of a sport support group or booster club.
- Provide or have helped arrange employment for student-athletes.
- Have been involved, in any way, with the promotion of the Vanderbilt University athletic program
- **NOTE:** Once a person is identified as a "Representative of the Institution's Athletics Interests," the person retains that identity **FOREVER**.

Recruiting

Recruitment of prospective student-athletes is the sole responsibility of Vanderbilt coaches. Do not become involved in the process.

Extra Benefits

Vanderbilt University's athletics interests (boosters) cannot provide an "extra benefit" or special arrangement to a prospect or to an enrolled student-athlete.



An extra benefit would include provision of any transportation, meals, clothes, entertainment, loans, or other benefits offered to a student-athlete or a student-athlete's relatives or friends unavailable to the general student population.

Examples of extra benefits that you cannot provide an athlete include, but are not limited to:

- Signing or cosigning a note with an outside agency to arrange a loan.
- Giving gifts of any kind (e.g., clothing, airline tickets, or holiday cards/gifts) or services (e.g., car repair, dental, free round of golf).
- Providing special discounts for goods and services.

Consequences to Boosters for NCAA Violations

Institutions are required by the NCAA to notify boosters of consequences regarding rules violations. Boosters found in violation of NCAA rules are subject to losing benefits and privileges, including season tickets.

The NCAA Committee on Infractions has processed cases in which penalties have included both the disassociation of boosters with the institution and the loss of season ticket privileges.

NICHOLAS S. ZEPPOS

Interim Chancellor

Nicholas S. Zeppos serves as interim chancellor of Vanderbilt University, accepting the position August 1, 2007.

Zeppos, a native of Milwaukee, Wisc., also holds the roles of provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs, and professor of law.

A distinguished legal scholar, teacher and executive, Zeppos has served since 2002 as Vanderbilt's chief academic officer, overseeing the university's undergraduate, graduate, and professional education programs and research in liberal arts and sciences, engineering, music, education, business, law, and divinity. As provost and vice chancellor, he chairs Vanderbilt's budgeting and capital planning council and leads all fundraising and alumni relations efforts across the institution, as well as overseeing the dean of students and dean of admissions.

Zeppos has led a number of important initiatives at Vanderbilt, including the planning process for The Commons, a landmark transformation of the first-year experience; the Strategic Academic Planning Group; innovative efforts in undergraduate admissions and financial aid; and the development of new programs in Jewish studies, law and economics, and genetics, among others. He also has led the university's Shape the Future fund-raising campaign, which exceeded its \$1.25 billion goal two years ahead of schedule and set a new target of \$1.75 billion by 2010.

Zeppos joined Vanderbilt in 1987 as an assistant professor in the Law School, where he has been recognized with five teaching awards. He subsequently served as an associate dean and then as associate provost before being named provost and vice chancellor for academic affairs in 2002.



From 1982-1987, Zeppos practiced law in Washington, D.C., at the United States Department of Justice and Wilmer, Cutler & Pickering, where he specialized in appellate litigation involving complex regulatory, statutory, and constitutional matters. He has written widely on legislation, administrative law, and professional responsibility, and is a nationally recognized scholar in these fields. He served as chair for the Scholars Committee, advising the Senate and the ABA on the confirmation of Justice Stephen Breyer, and as chair of the Rules Advisory Committee of the United States Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit. He has also served as a consultant to government agencies, major corporations, and trade associations on complex litigation, policy design, and strategy.

Zeppos is a 1979 magna cum laude graduate of the University of Wisconsin Law School where he served as editor in chief of the Wisconsin Law Review and was selected as the outstanding graduate of his class, and a 1976 Phi Beta Kappa graduate of the University of Wisconsin where he studied history.

He is married to Lydia Ann Howarth, a writer and editor. They have two sons, Benjamin, a junior at Princeton University, and Nicholas, a senior at University School in Nashville.



DAVID WILLIAMS II

Vice Chancellor for University Affairs

Vice Chancellor David Williams is one of the most influential leaders on the Vanderbilt campus in addition to directing Vanderbilt's vast athletics program.

Since September 2003, Williams has directed the effort to fully integrate Commodore athletics into the Vanderbilt community. With the support of Chancellor Gordon Gee and the Board of Trust, Williams' efforts have helped pave the way for more student-athlete participation in the mainstream of University life. Along the way, he has placed his stamp on the program, overseeing the retention and hiring of head coaches and adding two varsity sports.

Athletics is but an aspect of Williams' influential role on the Vanderbilt campus. In addition to overseeing athletics, Williams serves as General Counsel and Secretary of Vanderbilt and its nationally recognized Medical Center, and directs the 14-member General Counsel Office, the Office of Risk Management, the University's Compliance and Conflict of Interest functions, and the operations of the University's Board of Trust.

Williams' professional participation on campus also includes a tenured full professorship at the Vanderbilt School of Law, lecturing on Tax Law, Sports Law and Education Law. He also teaches an annual course on Law and Higher Education at Vanderbilt's Peabody College, and from time to time, courses in the undergraduate curriculum. Williams has not limited his activities to the Vanderbilt campus. He recently concluded a term on the NCAA Academics/Eligibility/Compliance Cabinet, helping set national policy regarding collegiate athletics.

Williams also supports youth athletic programs in the Nashville community, coaching a youth basketball team for the West Nashville Sports League and serving as a timer for the Nashville Aquatic Club.

Professionally, Williams serves as Chairman for the U.S. Federal Reserve Sixth District Board of Directors, Nashville Branch. He is an active member of the American Corporate Counsel Association, the National Association of College and University Attorneys and the American Bar Association. He is a member of the Continuing Legal Education committee of both the Nashville Bar Association and the NACUA. As a member of ABA's Section of Business Law, Williams serves as an active member of the Corporate Counsel Committee. He holds terms on two prestigious legal committees – the ABA Standing Committee on Public Education and the ABA Section on Legal Education and Admissions Standards Review Committee.

Williams has taught at the law schools of the University of Detroit, Capital University, the Ohio State University and Vanderbilt, and directed the Ohio State University Law Program in Oxford, England in 1992 and 1995. He was elected outstanding law professor at both the University of Detroit and Ohio State.

A resident of Nashville, Williams and his wife, Gail, have two school-aged children: Samantha, who is a varsity swimmer, and Nicholas, who competes in swimming, basketball and travel soccer. His wife serves the university as Associate Director of Community Relations.



LORI ALEXANDER

Director of Sports Operations

Lori Alexander is in her third year overseeing sport operations, though she is no stranger to the Vanderbilt family. She joined the Commodore team 10 years ago as a strength and conditioning coach working with women's basketball, lacrosse, tennis, golf, and soccer teams. Prior to her work with Vanderbilt, Alexander worked with athletes at the University of California-Berkeley for eight years. During her

time there, Alexander became chair of the Performance Enhancement and Advisory Committee which addressed concerns of student-athletes relating to performance and well being.

Alexander received her undergraduate degree in biology, health and physical education from Bethel College in 1984 before working as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame.

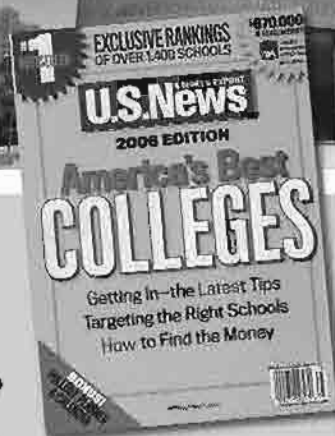

LIFESAVING CARE

During the 2005-06 basketball season, Vanderbilt athletic trainer Mike Meyer administered immediate aid and was credited for saving the life of Commodore player Davis Nwankwo, who collapsed from cardiac arrest at the start of a March practice session. For his efforts, Meyer was named the Division I "Above and Beyond" Athletic Trainer of the Year by the National Athletic Trainers Association.



Commodore Athletic Training

Commodore student-athletes receive the finest in medical attention from a collection of top athletic trainers and medical physicians assembled through a joint venture between the prestigious Vanderbilt University Medical Center and Sports Medicine Center.

Vanderbilt student-athletes receive daily health care in the 4,300-square foot training facility located at the McGugin Center as well as the training room available in Memorial Gymnasium. The training room at the McGugin Center is separated into three distinct areas: a pre-practice and taping area, a section for treatment and rehabilitation, and a hydrotherapy area featuring a state-of-the-art therapeutic swimming pool.

The athletic training staff at Vanderbilt is coordinated by Head Athletic Trainer Tom Bossung. Certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association, the staff numbers eight and also includes up to a dozen student-trainers, providing individualized care for each student-athlete in the Vanderbilt program.

The Vanderbilt Sports Medicine Center, recently relocated to a 90,000-square-foot facility, is housed under the Vanderbilt Orthopaedics Institute (VOI). The VOI welcomes patients from both inside the university and the general public. In addition to Sports Medicine, the VOI houses the Hand Center, Spine Center, Trauma, Oncology, Joint Replacement Center and Adult Physical and Occupational Therapy. Also housed in the VOI is digital X-ray, fluoroscopy and an MRI. Through this joint effort of services, Vanderbilt student-athletes are given access to several different specialists under one roof expediting medical care.

The team of qualified medical physicians responsible for treating Vanderbilt student-athletes is directed by Dr. Kurt Spindler, a sports medicine physician and orthopaedic surgeon. He is assisted by Dr. John "Jed" Kuhn, Dr. Warren Dunn, Dr. Andrew Gregory, Dr. Gene Hannah, Dr. Paul Rummo and Dr. Brian Thomson.

Noori helps the Vanderbilt student-athlete maximize his athletic potential by preparing carefully planned meals. Noori hopes to share his nutrition strategies with athletes across the country in his first book, *"Eating to Win with America's #1 Food Coach."* The key, he says, is not just balancing carbs, protein, fat, and micronutrients to meet the needs of each athlete, but timing the meals and snacks to maximize efficiency.

Noori performs his culinary magic in the Hendrix Room, Vanderbilt's athletic dining facility, where he provides student-athletes with the best collegiate nutritional care.

Many national media outlets, including CBS This Morning and *USA Today*, have featured Magic's culinary creations. *Sports Illustrated* has focused on Noori's talents in five editions.

Magic has been pleasing Commodore athletes since 1990. A former athlete himself, Noori knows that some student-athletes are working to gain weight and others need to shed pounds.

To Magic, the Training Table is far more than simply food. "We smile. I want the players to know they have friends here," Magic says.

That touch of home cookin' is accented with careful attention to food industry trends and the latest nutrition news. Magic's food line is always changing, adding a made-to-order smoothie station or omelet bar to meet the needs of each individual athlete.



ATHLETIC UPDATES

★ Hawkins Field

Vanderbilt's stylish baseball stadium completed a monumental transformation in 2006, including a team locker room, indoor practice facility and office complex. The stadium hosted an NCAA Regional in 2007.

★ Memorial Gymnasium

At a price tag of \$25 million, the Memorial Gym project offers a spacious practice gym, offices, donor room and suites. In 2006, Vanderbilt hosted the opening two rounds of the NCAA Women's Basketball Tournament.

★ John Rich Football Practice Complex

The \$2.5 million facility features an AstroPlay synthetic surface football field, a natural grass football field, state-of-the-art lighting and a superb drainage network.

★ The Conner Short Game Practice Facility at Vanderbilt Legends Club

This two-acre practice facility completed in 2004, includes three bentgrass greens, two chipping greens, a putting green, a 130-yard practice hole and five practice bunkers. Home to the men's and women's golf programs, the Vanderbilt Legends Club features 36 championship holes.

★ Track & Field Complex

Vanderbilt hosted the successful 2005 SEC Outdoor Track & Field Championships after a \$1.7 million renovation in 2003. It was the first SEC meet ever staged on campus.

★ Lacrosse/Soccer Stadium

The \$3.5 million stadium features a 2,000-seat grandstand, natural grass surface and state-of-the-art lighting system. Both teams have hosted NCAA Tournament games in recent years.

★ Tennis Complex

Finished with a \$1.5 million tag, the complex of six new outdoor, hard-court surfaces, a championship lighting system and grandstand allows Vanderbilt to host key NCAA tournaments.

★ Scoreboards and Video

As part of VU's relationship with ISP Sports, six Commodore facilities will receive significant upgrades to their scoreboard systems. Additionally, Vanderbilt Stadium, Memorial Gym and Hawkins Field will enjoy the latest in video board, matrix board and LED technology.
